We use prepositions of time to talk about when an action or event happens. at: clock times and specific times

in: months, years and even longer times

on: dates and days

I have dinner at 8:00 pm.

My birthday is <u>in</u> July. We go to the park on Friday.

I live in a big house.

adjective + noun

We use adjectives to tell us more about nouns.
Adjectives can be placed before the noun in a sentence.

I have a <u>blue</u> chair.

Other examples She sees a <u>small</u> rai

She sees a <u>small</u> rabbit. He sits under an <u>old</u> tree. Hamid <u>played</u> on the computer.

Other examples

We use past simple to describe actions that started and finished in the past. We can make past simple sentences with regular past verbs by adding –ed to the infinitive (base form of the verb).

They <u>visited</u> the park. I cleaned my room.

<u>cleaned</u> my room. <u>brushed</u> my teeth and <u>walked</u> to school.

She reads a red book. It has brown eyes. I have a big ball. **Functional language** point adjectives, nouns **Associated grammar**

I enjoy the beach. I like school. I don't like cats. **Functional language** point **Associated grammar** verbs, nouns, pronouns

They go to the park. I go to the beach. We drive to the city. **Functional language** point **Associated grammar** verbs, nouns, present simple
