# **Grammar Focus:**

### **Ability and Necessity**

This summary covers the rules for can/ can't - could/couldn't and have to / has to- had to in all time forms.

### 1. Present Ability

We use these expressions to talk about things we are able or unable to do in the present.

Form Use		Example
Can	What you are able to do <b>now</b>	I can use a laptop.
Can't	an't What you are not able to do now I can't download that app	

#### 2. Past Ability

We use these expressions to talk about things we were able or unable to do in the past.

Form	Use	Example
Could	General ability in the past.	When I was five, I <b>could</b> ride a small bicycle.
Couldn't	Lack of ability in the past.	In the past, people <b>couldn't</b> make video calls.

#### 3. Present Necessity

We use this form to talk about current obligations and requirements.

#### A. Obligation (Required)

Form	Used with Subjects	Example
Have to	I, You, We, They	I <b>have to</b> charge my phone every night.
Has to	He, She, It	My brother <b>has to</b> finish his project by Friday.

#### B. Lack of Obligation (Not Required)

Form	Used with Subjects	Example	
Don't have to	I, You, We, They	You <b>don't have to</b> print the report; a soft copy is fine.	
Doesn't have to	He, She, It	She <b>doesn't have to</b> come to the meeting if she is sick.	

### 4. Past Necessity

We use this form to talk about something that was required or not required in the past.

Form	Use	Example
Had to	To express obligation or requirement in the past. (Used with all subjects)	We <b>had to</b> wait for the internet to connect.
Didn't have to	To express something that was not required (not necessary) in the past.  They <b>didn't have to</b> worry about spam emails yet.	

Important Note: All forms of can / can't / could / couldn't have to / has to / had to are always followed by the Base Form of the verb.

## **Comparative Adverbs**

We use \*\*comparative adverbs \*\* to compare \*how\* actions are performed.

- -For most adverbs, add more before the adverb:
  - quickly → more quickly
  - slowly → more slowly
  - carefully → more carefully
- -Some adverbs are irregular (they change completely):
  - well → better
  - badly → worse

### Example:

It does everything more quickly than before.

It takes photos better.
