We use the present simple to talk about

- habits, repeated actions or something we do regularly

I usually watch TV after dinner.

He plays the guitar in a band.

- facts, things that are always or usually true

Chris lives in Scotland. Hens lay eggs.

- programmes and timetables

Our train leaves at 8.30 a.m.

The film starts at 6 o'clock.

Time expressions

We use these expressions with the present simple. Their place is at the beginning or the end of the sentence.

- *in (January), in the morning / the afternoon / the evening*

The shop closes for a few days in August.

In the afternoon, I sit in the garden and have a cup of tea.

- *on (Mondays / Monday), on weekdays, on (Saturday) morning / afternoon / evening*
- *at the weekend*

We don't go to school on Sunday.

On Tuesday afternoon, I go to an art class.

- *every day / week / month, once / twice / three times (etc) a week / month / year*

I drink two glasses of milk every day.

They go on holiday twice a year.

Adverbs of frequency

We use adverbs of frequency to show how often we do something. Usually, their place is before the main verb or after the verb *be*.

- *always, usually, often, sometimes, never*

My sister sometimes borrows my clothes.

Do they usually stay up late?

I'm always hungry.

This door is never closed.

Present continuous**Use**

We use the present continuous to talk about

- something that is happening now (at the moment or for a longer period).

Mum is talking on the phone right now.

He's taking driving lessons this month.

- temporary situations, something that is happening this time only

I'm staying at my grandmother's for a few days.

She usually takes the bus to school, but today she's walking.

Time expressions

We use these time expressions with the present continuous. Their place is at the beginning or the end of the sentence

- *at the moment, now, right now, today, this week / month / year, these days*

It isn't raining at the moment.

He's working hard these days.

State verbs

Some verbs describe a state, not an action.

These verbs do not have a continuous form. We use them only in the present simple form. These verbs are:

- see, look, hear, sound, smell, taste, feel
- like, dislike, love, hate, prefer, not mind
- think, know, believe, seem, remember, forget, remind, understand, realise
- have (= possess), want, need, mean, own, belong, cost

This music sounds horrible!

~~*This music is sounding horrible!*~~

I think he's very good.

~~*I'm thinking he's very good.*~~

Some state verbs can be both state and action verbs depending on their meaning. As state

verbs they do not have a continuous form, but as action verbs they do. Look at these examples:

- *She has her MP3 player with her today.*
(have = possess, state verb)
- *She's having lunch with her friends today.*
(have lunch = eat, action verb)
- *I think you're right.*
(think = believe, have an opinion, state verb)
- *What are you thinking about?* (think = what goes through our mind, active verb)

Other verbs like these are:

State verb	Action verb
see	see (= meet)
look (= appear)	look
smell (= have an odour)	smell
feel (= have texture)	feel (= give an impression)

Past simple

Use

We use the past simple to talk about

- an action that started and finished in the past. We usually say when it happened or imply that it was a specific time in the past.

They went to Spain last year.

- a past state

We lived in London in 2001.

- a past habit

He exercised every day when he was at college.

Form

- To form the past simple of regular verbs, we add -ed or -d to the main verb.

jump → jumped try → tried

stop → stopped love → loved

- Irregular verbs don't form the past simple with -ed. Each irregular verb is different.

go → went get → got take → took

leave → left

- In negative sentences and questions, we use *did / didn't* and the infinitive. We don't use the past simple form of the verb.

She didn't answer the phone.

~~*She didn't answered the phone.*~~

Did they break the vase?

~~*Did they broke the vase?*~~

- The past simple of *be* is *was / were*.

Remember: we don't use *did / didn't* with *was / were*.

He was a good student.

We weren't cold last night.

Time expressions

We use these time expressions with the past simple:

- *yesterday, yesterday morning / afternoon / evening*
- *this morning / afternoon (when they are in the past)*
- *two hours / days / weeks / months / years ago*
- *last week / month / year / Saturday night*
- *in 2008 / June / the summer*

Used to

Use

We use *used to* to talk about past habits or states that were true in the past, but are not true now.

- *I used to stay with my grandmother every summer when I was a child.*

We use the past continuous to talk about

- an action that was in progress at a specific time in the past.

I was doing my homework at 6.30 p.m.

They were driving to work at that time.

- two actions that were in progress at the same time in the past. We use *while* to link the two sentences.

I was reading a magazine while the boys were playing in the garden.

While he was talking on the phone, she was drying her hair.

Past simple and past continuous

- We use the past simple and past continuous to talk about an action that happened (past simple) while another action was in progress (past continuous).

We were having lunch when we heard a loud bang.

- To link the sentences, we use *when* before the past simple and *while* or *as* before the past continuous.

It was raining when we came out of the cinema.

When the teacher came in, we were sitting down.

As she was looking through her papers, she found my diary.

## Use

We use the present perfect to talk about

- something that happened in the recent past and its results affect the present.

*I've left my book at school. I can't do my homework now!*

- something that happened in the past, but we do not mention when.

*A new restaurant has opened near the cinema.*

- a state that began in the past and continues up to the present.

*She's worked in this shop since 1997.*

*I've known him since we were four years old.*

- our experiences, something we have or have not done.

*We've been on a hot air balloon flight.*

*I've seen all his films.*

- We often use *ever* and *never* with the present perfect when we talk about our experiences. We use *ever* in questions.

*Have you ever done an extreme sport?*

- We only use *never* in positive sentences. The meaning of a sentence with *never* is negative: *never* + positive verb = negative meaning.

*We have never met. ✓*

*I haven't never played golf. X*

## Form

We use *have / has* and the past participle of the verb to form the present perfect.

We form the past participle of regular verbs by adding *-(e)d* to the infinitive.

*look → looked change → changed*

*travel → travelled*

Irregular verbs do not follow a rule. Each verb has a different past participle.

*make → made cut → cut give → given*

*teach → taught*

- we use the past simple to talk about something that happened at a specific time in the past. We either say or imply exactly when it happened.

- We use the present perfect continuous to put emphasis on how long an activity has been going on.

*Harry has been selling homemade cakes at the school fete all morning.*

(= the emphasis is on how long he has been doing this activity)

- We use the present perfect simple to put emphasis on the result of the activity, or what we have achieved through it.

*Harry has sold eighteen cakes so far.*

(= the emphasis is on the result of the activity; that is, how many cakes he has sold)

- Sometimes we can use either tense without changing the meaning of the sentence.

*I have lived here for three years.*

*I have been living here for three years.*

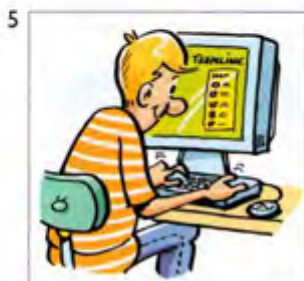

**Ability****Can, could**

- We use *can* + verb to talk about our general ability to do something. It has only two forms: *can* in the present and *could* in the past.

*She can play the piano very well.*

*They could run faster when they were younger.*

**Be able to**

- We use *be able to* (+ verb) to talk about our ability to do something. *Be able to* can replace *can* in the present, future and present perfect forms.

*Tom is able to buy his own clothes.*

*We'll be able to see real lions at the safari park.*

*They've always been able to help us.*

**Could or was / were able to?**

In the past, we use *could* to talk about our general ability to do something.

- We use *was / were able to* to talk about something we managed to do in a particular case.

*He could lift heavy objects because he was very strong.*

*In the end, I was able to lift the heavy sofa with the help of a friend.*

**NOT:** ~~*In the end, I could lift the heavy box with the help of a friend.*~~

- In the negative we can use both forms (*couldn't*, *wasn't*, *weren't able to*) to talk about something we managed to do.

*They couldn't get tickets for the show.*

*They weren't able to get tickets for the show.*

*I am not allowed to stay out later than 9 o'clock.*

We use *must* or *have to* in positive sentences and questions to talk about something we are obliged to do.

*They must hand in their homework project on Friday.*

*Do all the passengers have to wear a seat belt?*

- *Must* has no other tenses except the present simple. *Have to* replaces *must* in the past simple, future and present perfect.

*We must get up early today.*

*We had to get up early yesterday.*

*We will have to get up early tomorrow.*

*We have had to get up early every day this week.*

**Must or have to in the present?**

In the present simple, we use both *must* and *have to* with a small difference in meaning

- *must* suggests that the speaker feels the obligation to do something.
- *have to* suggests that the obligation comes from someone else.

*I can't go out. I must study for the test.*

(= I feel the obligation to do it)

*I have to finish the project today.*

(= I don't have a choice; there's a deadline)

**Need (necessity)**

We use *need* when we want to talk about the necessity to do something.

*I need to buy a new pair of trainers.*

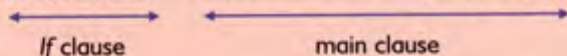

## Read the information.

**Countable nouns**

Countable nouns are the things we can count. These nouns always have a plural form.

*One egg, three pencils, six bags, twenty people.*

**Uncountable nouns**

Uncountable nouns are the things we cannot count because of their nature: they do not have a constant shape or quantity and they do not form units by themselves. These nouns do not have a plural form.

*I need some air.*

*This tea smells wonderful.*

Uncountable nouns are

- all liquids and gases  
e.g. *water, milk, petrol, air, helium* etc
- some solids  
e.g. *sugar, flour, butter, chocolate, sand, dust* etc
- material nouns  
e.g. *metal, wood, wool, hair, plastic, paper* etc
- abstract nouns  
e.g. *love, friendship, work, help, advice, news, information, time, room* etc
- generic nouns  
e.g. *furniture, luggage, money, rubbish* etc
- When we want to count quantities of uncountable nouns we use units of measurement or count their containers.  
*a litre of (cream) a glass of (water)*

*a bottle of (juice) a tin of (soup)*

*a kilo of (sugar) a jar of (honey)*

*a bar of (chocolate) a carton of (milk)*

*a tub of (ice cream) a packet of (nuts)*

*a cup of (tea) a loaf of (bread)*

- We use the expression *a piece of (+ noun)* both for concrete and abstract nouns.  
*A piece of cake, a piece of metal, a piece of luggage, a piece of jewellery, a piece of news, a piece of information, a piece of advice, etc*
- Some nouns appear both as countable and as uncountable but with a different meaning.

**Plural nouns**

- Some nouns appear only in plural form, although we talk about one unit. They refer to things that have two parts. We use the expression *(a) pair of* to count them.  
*A pair of jeans / trousers / shorts / tights / leggings / glasses / sunglasses / scissors, etc.*  
*I need a new pair of jeans.*  
*She's got six pairs of glasses.*
- Nouns that refer to a group of people or things are used with a plural verb.  
*police, team, clothes, stairs, etc*  
*Our team are doing their best.*  
*The stairs are more tiring, but they're better exercise than the lift.*

**Some, any, no, every****Some**

We use *some* with

- countable nouns in the plural. We use *some* in positive sentences.

*There are some biscuits in the jar.*

*I can see some people in the street.*

- uncountable nouns in positive sentences.

*There's some rubbish in the garden.*

*I've got some ice cream for you.*

- We use *some* in questions both with countable and uncountable nouns when we make an offer or when we make a request.

*Would you like some tea?*

*Can I have some strawberries, please?*

- We use *someone / somebody, something, somewhere* in the same way as *some*.

*Someone has left this parcel for you.*

*I know my keys are somewhere in the house.*

**Any**

- We use *any* with countable and uncountable nouns in questions and negative sentences.
- We use *anyone / anybody, anything, anywhere* in the same way as *any*.

*Are there any eggs in the fridge?*

*There isn't any water in the jug.*

*Is there anyone at home right now?*

*I don't know anything about him.*

**No**

- We use *no* with countable and uncountable nouns in positive sentences. Because *no* is negative, the meaning of the sentence is negative. We use *no-one / nobody, nothing* and *nowhere* in the same way.

*I've got no money with me.*

(= I haven't got any money with me.)

*There are no animals in the picture.*

(= There aren't any animals in the picture.)

*There's no-one in the classroom.*

(= There isn't anyone in the classroom.)

*There's nothing wrong with it.*

(= There isn't anything wrong with it.)

**Every**

- We can only use *every* with countable nouns in the singular in positive and negative sentences, and in questions. We use *everyone / everybody, everything* and *everywhere* in the same way.

*Every book in this bookcase is more than fifty years old.*

*Everyone knows this isn't true.*

*Is everything ready?*

*I haven't looked everywhere yet.*

**Much, many, a lot of / lots of, a little, a few**

- We use these words to talk about the quantity of nouns in general terms.

**Much, many**

- We use *much* and *many* in questions and negative sentences.
- We use *much* with uncountable nouns and *many* with countable nouns.

*Is there much water in the lake this year?*

*I haven't got much time, so be quick.*

*Have you got many emails today?*

*There aren't many shops in this area.*

**A lot of / lots of**

- We use *a lot of / lots of* with both uncountable and countable nouns, usually in positive sentences. There is no difference in meaning between these two expressions.

*There's lots of room for all of us here.*

*There are a lot of people here today.*

**A little, a few**

- We use *a few* with countable nouns and *a little* with uncountable nouns. Both expressions have a positive meaning.

*There are a few chairs here.*

(= there are enough chairs)

*There's a little juice in this carton.*

(= it's enough)

- The indefinite article *a / an* goes before countable nouns in the singular.
- We use *a* before nouns or adjectives + noun that start with a consonant, and *an* before those that start with a vowel.

- Be careful with words that begin with *eu, u* and *h*. Read them aloud first to see if their first letter sounds like a vowel or a consonant:

**The definite article: the**

The definite article *the* goes before uncountable nouns, countable nouns in the singular and plural and adjectives + noun.

We use *the*

- when we talk about something specific or unique

*Where's the camera?*

(a specific camera, not any camera)

*The moon is very bright tonight.*

(unique, there's only one moon)

- before names of oceans (*the Atlantic Ocean*), seas (*the Mediterranean*), rivers (*the Nile*), mountain ranges (*the Alps*), deserts (*the Sahara desert*)
- before the names of these countries / states: *the USA (United States of America), the UK (United Kingdom), the Netherlands, the United Arab Emirates, the Bahamas, the Philippines*
- before the names of cinemas, theatres and venues (*the Odeon, the Barbican*), hotels (*the Cumberland, the Dorchester*), museums (*the Museum of National History, the V&A*), newspapers (*the Guardian, the Times*), organisations (*the United Nations*) and ships (*the Costa Atlantica*)

before the names of families (*the Hardys, the Browns*) and nationalities (*the British, the French*)

- before collective adjectives (= adjectives we use to talk about a group of people) (*the young, the old, the poor, the educated*)
- before musical instruments (*the guitar, the piano*) and the word *radio* (*I listen to the radio*)
- before these words: *the cinema, the theatre, the bank, the post office, the station, the airport, the shops, the doctor, the dentist, the garage* etc  
*I've got a toothache. I need to go to the dentist. I'd like to see this film. Let's go to the cinema.*
- before: *the police, the fire brigade, the army*
- with the time expressions: *in the morning / afternoon / evening / night* but not with the expression *at night*

**Zero article**

Zero article means *no article* (= we do not use any article).

We do not use an article

- before proper names  
*Nick is in the car.*

- before abstract nouns

*Life in these areas can be hard.*

- before plural nouns and uncountable nouns when we talk about them in general terms

*Elephants have an excellent memory.*

(elephants as a species, in general)

*This is where the elephants live.*

(this particular group of elephants)

- before the names of countries (*Italy, Belgium*), cities (*Copenhagen, Vienna*), continents (\**Europe, Africa*), mountains (*Mt Everest, Mt Olympus*), lakes (*Loch Ness, Lake Titikaka*), streets or squares (*Oxford Street, Berkeley Square*) and parks (*Central Park*)

#### The TeenLink Files: Glass

Glass is made from sand, soda ash, lime and cullet. Cullet is recycled glass that has been crushed into a powder. To make glass, the first three ingredients are carefully weighed and mixed by the glass maker. Then he / she adds cullet to the mixture. The mixture is melted in special furnaces until it looks like thick syrup. When it cools, this syrupy mass becomes glass. After it has been given its final shape, the glass is reheated and then cooled. This is done to make it stronger.

Glass can be given almost any shape. Today glass is made in factories, but in ancient times it was made by hand. No one knows exactly when or where glass was first made, but it was produced as far back as 2000 BC by the Egyptians and perhaps the Phoenicians. The oldest method used to shape glass was blowing. A ball of melted glass was placed at the end of a long iron pipe and the glass maker blew air into it, just as we do with balloons today, but more gently. This way the glass at the end of the pipe could be blown into any shape and thickness. This method is still used today to produce hand-made glass objects and objects of art.

### Agent

- The focus of the passive form is the action itself, not who does it. However, when we want to say who does the action (called the 'agent'), we use *by* and the name or noun.
- We use the agent only when *by* doing so we add information to our sentence or make it clearer.

*All the photos were taken by my brother.*

- We do not use the agent when we do not want to give this information or when we do not know who the agent is.

*All the reports have been collected.*

(who collected them is not important)

*Her handbag was stolen!*

(we do not know who did it)

- We do not use the agent when it is easily understood or when it is vague, e.g. *someone*, *people*, *they*.

**Active:** *The police have arrested the thief.*

**Passive:** *The thief has been arrested.*

(easily understood, only the police can arrest someone.)

**Active:** *People do this exercise in three minutes.*

**Passive:** *This exercise can be done in three minutes.*

(vague, we are referring to people in general, so there is no information added by using an agent.)

- When a sentence is turned from the active into the passive:
- the object of the active clause becomes the subject of the passive clause (remember that only verbs that take an object can become passive verbs).
- the verb changes from the active to the passive. The tense stays the same, e.g. active present continuous becomes present continuous passive.

- The subject of the active clause becomes the agent of the passive clause if necessary.

## Hair Fashions in Ancient Egypt

In ancient Egypt, common people had their hair cut short.

Rich Egyptians had hairdressers to look after their hair. They had it washed and perfumed very often. Both men and women wore wigs for formal occasions. These wigs were made from human hair or wool.

Priests had their heads shaved to honour their gods. This was also a sign of cleanliness.

We use the comparative form to compare two people, animals, objects or situations between them.

*Dan is older than I am.*

*Your joke was funnier than mine.*

*The film was more interesting than I had expected.*

**Superlative form of adjectives**

- the (1–2 syllable adjective) -est  
*Tom is the tallest boy in his class.*
- the most (2 + syllable adjective)  
*He is the most intelligent person I know.*

Some adjectives form the comparative and superlative irregularly. They are listed in the tables on page 90.

**Use**

We use the superlative form to compare one person, animal, object or situation with a number of others. With the superlative, we single out this person (animal, etc) from the rest because it has the quality that the adjective describes to the highest degree.

*She is the fastest runner in her team.*

*Fred is the youngest in his family.*

*This is the most expensive pair of jeans in the shop.*

*This is the silliest thing you've ever done.*

**Adverbs**

We use adverbs

- to give information about how something is done (adverbs of manner), when it is done (adverbs of time) or where something is (adverbs of place).
- Adverbs of manner are formed by adding the ending -ly to the adjective. Some adverbs are formed irregularly (e.g. good–well).

The adverb goes

- after a verb that doesn't have an object or after the object

*She plays tennis well. They opened slowly.*

- before an adjective or participle that is used as an adjective

*It is terribly easy to do this.*

*The engine is carefully designed.*

**Comparative form of adverbs**

- more (2 + syllable adverbs or adverbs that end in -ly) than  
*He played more carefully than his brother.*

**Superlative form of adverbs**

- the most (2+ syllable adverbs or adverbs that end in -ly)  
*It was the most beautifully wrapped present I had ever seen.*

Spelling rules for adverbs → page 141.

Some adverbs form the comparative and superlative irregularly. They are listed in the tables on page 90.

**Use**

We use the comparative and superlative forms of adverbs in the same way that we use the comparative and superlative forms of adjectives.

*She writes more neatly than you do.*

*They behaved the most irresponsibly of all.*

Please note that the adverb *far* has two comparative and superlative forms

- We use *far – farther – farthest* when we talk about actual distance and *far – further – furthest* when we are using the adverb figuratively.

*He lives farther away from the school than me.*

*This is the furthest we can help you.*

When we make a comparison between two people, animals, objects, etc and we find that they are the same we use

- as + adjective / adverb + as

*I am as tall as you are.*

*They worked as carefully as we did.*

When we make a comparison and find that the people, animals, objects, etc we compare are not the same, we use

- not so / as + adjective / adverb + as

*The T-shirt isn't as expensive as the jeans.*

*They don't stay up so late as you do.*

**Less + adjective / adverb (+ than)**

When we make a comparison we can use the word *less* instead of *more*.

*Going out is more interesting than watching TV.*

*Watching TV is less interesting than going out.*

**Far / Much + comparative**

We can use the words *far* and *much* before the adjective / adverb when we make a comparison to emphasise that the difference between the two people, animals, objects, etc we are comparing is great.

*She is a far better cook than her mother.*

*This is a much more comfortable sofa than the old one.*

*He is too young to drive. (= he isn't allowed to drive because of his age)*

- with the expression *(not) adjective / adverb + enough + infinitive*

*It's warm enough to play outside.*

*I am not tall enough to reach the shelf.*

- The word 'enough' gives a positive meaning to the sentence. It means 'just as much as it should be' or 'just as much as is necessary'

*He's good enough to be a professional musician.*

(= he can be a professional musician if he wants to)

- with the expression *it + to be + adjective + infinitive*

*It's nice to go on a short holiday when you can.*

*It was interesting to learn that the temple dated back to the 4th century BC.*

- with the expression *subject + to be + adjective + infinitive*

*They were happy to offer me the job.*

*I'm sorry to hear you are not well.*

*She's glad to be in the play.*

**Infinitive without 'to'**

We use the infinitive without 'to'

- after the verbs *let* and *make*

*I'll let you use my computer if you are careful.*

*My music teacher made me play the same piece three times.*

- with the expression *would rather*

*I'd rather do this on my own if you don't mind.*

*He'd rather stay in a hotel.*

- with the expression *had better*

*You'd better book the tickets as soon as possible.*

*She'd better not sing. She has an awful voice.*

- after some modal verbs, such as *could, may, might, must, should*

*He must call his parents right now.*

*You shouldn't wear my T-shirt without my permission.*

- The verb *help* can be followed by both the infinitive with 'to' and the infinitive without 'to'. It makes no difference in meaning.

*Will you help me carry these bags?*

**The gerund**

The gerund is formed by adding *-ing* to the basic form of the verb.

We use the gerund

- as a noun. It can be the subject or object of another verb and it can take an adjective.

*Travelling by plane is faster than taking the car.*

*Careful planning is necessary in this job.*

- after some expressions that end with a preposition:

*be afraid of, be interested in, be bad at, be keen on, be bored with, be sorry for, be crazy about, be tired of, be fed up with, have difficulty in, be fond of, look forward to, be good at*

*I'm sorry for breaking your vase.*

*She's keen on knitting.*

- after the verbs:

*avoid, keep, deny, mind, dislike, remember, enjoy, stop, finish, suggest*

*He has finished talking.*

*I don't mind waiting.*

- after the expressions:

*can't help, it's no good, can't stand, it's not worth, it's no use*

*It's not worth repairing this TV. You'd better buy a new one.*

*Sorry, I can't help laughing. It was such a funny story!*

- with the expression *be/get + used + to + doing (something)*

**NB:** Do not confuse this expression with the expression *used + to do + (something)*.

*I used to live in London. (= it is something I did in the past but not now)*

*I am used to living in London. (= at first I found it hard / didn't like it, but it's OK now)*

**Gerund or infinitive?**

These verbs can be followed by either the gerund or the infinitive without changing their meaning:

*begin, hate, continue, prefer, like, start, love*

*Suddenly, it started to rain.*

*Suddenly, it started raining.*

*I prefer sleeping with a light on.*

*I prefer to sleep with a light on.*

These verbs can be followed by either the gerund or the infinitive but the meaning of the sentence changes:

*stop, remember, try*

*She remembered to take her bag.*

*(She took it with her.)*

*She remembered taking her bag.*

*(She recalls the fact that she had her bag with her.)*

*They stopped reading this magazine.*

*(They don't do this anymore.)*

*They stopped to read this magazine.*

*(They stopped in order to read this magazine.)*

*I tried to fix the bike myself.*

*(I put some effort into it.)*

*I tried fixing the bike myself.*

*(I made an attempt just to see if I could do it.)*

We use direct speech when we want to tell someone what a third person has said using the exact words. By doing this we 'quote' what this person has said.

We use a reporting verb and quotes (' '). The most common reporting verbs are *say* and *ask*.

*Ed said, 'I play volleyball every week.'*

*They asked 'Where is the teacher's office?'*

**Reported speech****Statements**

We use reported speech when we want to tell someone what a third person has said but without using the exact words.

We use a reporting verb but we do not use quotes. The most common reporting verbs in reported statements are *say* and *tell*. We can use the word *that* to introduce the reported sentence if we like.

*He said, 'I'm having a good time.'*

(direct speech)

*He said (that) he was having a good time.*

• (reported speech)

**What changes from direct to reported statements?**

- The reporting verb.

| Direct speech                  | Reported speech                                                            |
|--------------------------------|----------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| John said, 'I am tired.'       | John said (that) he was tired.<br>(reporting verb without indirect object) |
| John said to me, 'I am tired.' | John told me (that) he was tired.<br>(reporting verb with indirect object) |

- Personal pronouns, object pronouns and possessive adjectives.

All changes are made according to who is talking about whom. For example:

| Direct speech                                                          | Reported speech                       |
|------------------------------------------------------------------------|---------------------------------------|
| George said to me, 'I like you'.<br>(subject pronoun) (object pronoun) | George told me he liked me.           |
| Kate said, 'My room is a mess!'<br>(possessive adjective)              | Kate said (that) her room was a mess. |

- Verb tenses.

We change verb tenses when the reporting verb is in the past simple. We do this because we are now at a different point in time from when the actual words were spoken. For example:

| Direct speech                                         | Reported speech                                             |
|-------------------------------------------------------|-------------------------------------------------------------|
| Last Saturday, Peter said, 'I'm going to the cinema.' | Last Saturday Peter said (that) he was going to the cinema. |

At the time we are speaking, Saturday is in the past.

We have to change the tense to show this.

You will find a table that shows how tenses change from direct to reported speech on page 108.

**Reported speech****Commands and requests**

- In direct speech, we use the imperative to order someone to do something (command) or ask someone to do something (request).

**What changes from direct to reported commands and requests?**

- The verbs we use to introduce reported commands are *tell* and *order*. The verbs we use to report a request are *ask* and in some cases *beg* if it is appropriate. We do not use *say*.

## Use

We use a question tag at the end of a sentence when we are almost certain about something, but we would like our listener to confirm it.

## Form

We form question tags with an auxiliary verb and a pronoun.

We always use a comma before a question tag.

*Tom and Sandra go to school by bus, don't they?*

*Fred's got a baby sister, hasn't he?*

*They can't do this, can they?*

- When the sentence is positive, the question tag is negative.

*It's a lovely day, isn't it?*

- When the sentence is negative, the question tag is positive.

*Peter hasn't called, has he?*

- When there is a negative word in the sentence (e.g. *never, rarely, seldom*), the question tag is positive.

*She's never been to Italy, has she?*

*They seldom go out, do they?*

- The question tag for *I am* is *aren't I?*

*I'm lucky today, aren't I?*

- The question tag for *Let's* is *shall we?* It is the same for positive and negative sentences.

*Let's have a break, shall we?*

*Let's not go out tonight, shall we?*

- The question tag for the imperative is *will you?* It is the same for positive and negative sentences.

- When the subject of a sentence is the word *there* (e.g. *There is / There are*) we also use it in the question tag, instead of a pronoun.

#### When Lightning Strikes ...

by Harry Davis



Although we don't expect them, thunderstorms are quite common in spring and summer. Despite lasting a short time, thunderstorms are dangerous because they produce lightning, which can kill.

If you see lightning, which is a flash of light, and can hear thunder, which is a loud rumbling noise, you are so close to the storm that you might be in danger. Go to a safe place immediately, such as a house or a car. Whatever you do, don't stand under a tree. Trees attract lightning and it is not safe to shelter under them because of this.

Don't use the telephone or anything electrical because if lightning hits, it can travel through the electrical wires. It can travel through water, too, so don't take a bath or a shower. Swimming in the sea is also dangerous.

**Relative clauses**

We use relative clauses to give more information about a noun in the main sentence.

*The man answered the phone.* (main clause)

*The man was my dad.*

(information about the subject of the main clause)

*The man who answered the phone was my dad.*

(relative clause)

**Relative pronouns**

We use relative pronouns in the beginning of a relative clause. Relative pronouns refer to a noun in the main sentence and they come directly after it. Here's a list of relative pronouns:

- who for people
- whom for people
- which for things or animals
- that for people, animals or things
- whose for people, animals or things
- where for places
- when for time

*The customer who bought the TV left his credit card behind.*

*The house which had stood at the top of the cliff was gone.*

*The town where I grew up is very small.*

**Defining relative clauses**

Defining relative clauses give essential information about the noun they refer to. Without them, the main clause doesn't make sense. Look at the example:

*The people are very noisy.* (main sentence)

*They live in the flat above ours.*

(essential information)

The main clause doesn't make sense unless we define who we are talking about.

This information comes in the relative clause.

*The people who live in the flat above us are very noisy.*

- We place a defining relative clause directly after the noun it defines, without using a comma to separate them.

*The woman who had found the lost cat was happy to return it to its owner.*

- When we speak we prefer to use *that* instead of *who* or *which*.

*What's the title of the song that is playing now?*

- When the relative pronoun (*whom*, *which*, *that*) is the object of the relative clause, we usually leave it out.

*The book is very good.* (main clause)

*You gave me this book.* (*this book* is the object)

*The book (that) you gave me is very good.*

- We never leave out the relative pronoun if it refers to the subject of the main clause.

*The book is very good.* (main clause)

*The book won the prize.* (*the book* is the subject)

*The book that won the prize is very good.*

**Non-defining relative clauses**

- Non-defining relative clauses give us extra information about the noun to which they refer. The information is not essential because the main clause is complete without it.

*Tom Davis is a well-known writer.* (main clause)

*Tom Davis is Harry's uncle.*

(extra information about the subject of the main clause)

*Tom Davis, who is Harry's uncle, is a well-known writer.*

- We place a non-defining relative clause directly after the noun it defines. We use commas to separate the non-defining clause from the main clause.
- We never leave out the relative pronoun in a non-defining relative clause.
- We don't use the relative pronoun *that* in non-defining relative clauses.

*Mr Brown's car, which was parked illegally, was taken away.*

*Sandra, whom you met last night, is a doctor.*

We use a clause of purpose when we want to state the purpose of the action in the main clause.

There are three different ways to form a clause of purpose

- to + infinitive

*He hired an assistant to help him at the shop.*

- in order to + infinitive

*They went to the bank in order to see the manager.*

- so that + subject + can / will (for the present)

*I'll leave early so that I won't need to rush.*

- so that + subject + could / would (for the past)

*She finished her homework quickly so that she could watch her favourite TV show.*

## Clauses of result

We use a clause of result when we talk about the result that comes from the main clause.

There are three ways to form a clause of result

- so + clause

*We missed the last bus so we had to take a cab.*

- so + adjective/adverb + that

*The film was so good that I saw it twice.*

- such + a / an + adjective + singular noun + that

*It was such an interesting book that I couldn't put it down.*

- such + adjective + plural noun / uncountable noun + that

*They were such well-behaved kids that everyone loved them.*

**Clauses of reason**

We use a clause of reason when we want to talk about why something in the main clause happens.

There are two different ways to form a clause of reason

- *because* + clause

*We are happy because we've just had some good news.*

- *because of* + noun

*Our flight was cancelled because of the fog.*

**Clauses of concession**

We use these when we want to show that what the main clause states happens in spite of what the clause of concession states.

There are four different ways to form a clause of concession

- *but* + clause

*I tried to call her but her mobile was switched off.*

- *However*, + clause

*John hated beans. However, he ate the bean soup without a word.*

- *although* + clause

*Although we were late, she refused to hurry.*

- *in spite of / despite* + gerund

There is no difference in meaning or use between *in spite of* and *despite*.

*In spite of following the instructions, we couldn't make the machine work.*

*Despite playing well, he lost the game.*

- *in spite of / despite* + the fact that + clause

*In spite of the fact that they knew no one at the party, they had a good time.*

- *in spite of / despite* + noun

*The climbers started early in the morning despite the bad weather forecast.*

  - We add *-es* to verbs that end in *-o*, *-ss*, *-ch*, *-sh* or *-x*:  
*go* → *goes*                      *miss* → *misses*  
*push* → *pushes*                *match* → *matches*  
*fix* → *fixes*
  - For verbs that end in consonant + *-y*, we change *-y* to *-i* and add *-es*:  
*study* → *studies*                *try* → *tries*

- For verbs that end in vowel + *-y*, we just add *-s*:  
*play* → *plays*                      *enjoy* → *enjoys*

## Verb + *-ing*

- To make the *-ing* form of most verbs, we add *-ing* at the end of the verb:  
*talk* → *talking*  
*read* → *reading*  
*say* → *saying*
  - For verbs that end in *-e*, we take away the *-e* and add *-ing*:  
*live* → *living*  
*take* → *taking*
- but**
- For verbs that end in *-ee*, we add *-ing*:  
*see* → *seeing*  
*agree* → *agreeing*
  - With one-syllable verbs that end in one vowel + consonant, we double the final consonant and add *-ing*:  
*run* → *running*  
*fit* → *fitting*
- but**
- For one-syllable verbs that end in two vowels + consonant, we just add *-ing*:  
*eat* → *eating*  
*cook* → *cooking*
  - For two-syllable verbs that end in a vowel and consonant, we double the consonant if the stress is on the second syllable:  
*begin* → *beginning*
- but**
- For two-syllable verbs that end in a vowel and consonant, we don't double the consonant if the stress is on the first syllable:  
*shorten* → *shortening*

## Past simple

- We add *-ed* to most regular verbs:  
*look* → *looked*                      *answer* → *answered*                      *pull* → *pulled*
- For verbs that end in *-e* we add *-d*:  
*like* → *liked*                      *dance* → *danced*
- For verbs that end in consonant + *-y*, we change *-y* to *-i* and add *-ed*:  
*cry* → *cried*                      *study* → *studied*

- For verbs that end in vowel + *-y*, we add *-ed*:  
*play* → *played*                      *stay* → *stayed*
- For verbs that end in one vowel + consonant, we double the final consonant and add *-ed*:  
*drop* → *dropped*                      *fit* → *fitted*

### but

- For verbs that end in two vowels + consonant, we just add *-ed*:  
*heat* → *heated*                      *colour* → *coloured*
- For verbs that end in *-l*, we double the last letter before we add *-ed*:  
*travel* → *travelled*                      *shovel* → *shovelled*

## Comparatives and superlatives

- To form the comparative and superlative of most one or two syllable adjectives, we add *-er* or *-est*:  
*fast* → *faster* → *the fastest*  
*young* → *younger* → *the youngest*  
*warm* → *warmer* → *the warmest*
- For adjectives that end in *-e*, we add *-r* or *-st*:  
*wise* → *wiser* → *the wisest*  
*late* → *later* → *the latest*
- For one syllable adjectives that end in one vowel + consonant, we double the final consonant and add *-er* or *-est*:  
*thin* → *thinner* → *the thinnest*  
*hot* → *hotter* → *(the) hottest*
- For adjectives that end in *-y*, we change *-y* to *-i* and add *-er* or *-est*:  
*healthy* → *healthier* → *the healthiest*  
*lazy* → *lazier* → *the laziest*

## Adverbs of manner

- To form most adverbs of manner, we add *-ly* to an adjective:  
*polite* → *politely*                      *careless* → *carelessly*
- For adjectives that end in *-y*, we change *-y* to *-i* and add *-ly*:  
*tidy* → *tidily*                      *pretty* → *prettily*                      *easy* → *easily*
- For adjectives that end in *-l*, we add *-ly*:  
*careful* → *carefully*                      *beautiful* → *beautifully*
