

The Jolly Phonics Workbooks teach progressively, with more to learn in each Workbook. Progress can be assessed on the skills checklist below.


Reading	
<u> </u>	ages 2-10 and 15-17
Can blend regular words with this group of sounds For example: round, brown, queen, butter, farmer, boil, shout.	s. page 21
Writing	
Can write the seventh group of sounds - qu, ou, oi, ue, er, ar. Can also write regular words using these sounds, such as: out, spoil, star, dark, later, quick, quit, count.	pages 3-10 and 17
Understands that many sounds have more than one way of being written. For example: ai/oy (boil/boy), ou/ow (out/owl), er/ir/ur (her/bird/turn	pages 20, 21
Can begin to choose between er, ir and ur in spelling words.	page 20







The letter q borrows the sounds of K and W.










Action: Cup hands around mouth and shout as if to another boat, oi!, ship ahoy!



Action: Point to people around you and say you, you, you.




For making The Bad Tempered Goat book.


In this last book in the series, the numbers eight and nine have been included.

Further Guidance

Pages 5, 21. The ou Sound.

As with other sounds, the sound is introduced first with one spelling, ou, and then the alternative, ow, is introduced later. However the ow spelling has two common sounds, the sound in cow/how/now, or the sound in low/grow/show. After explaining the difference, use the rule "if one doesn't work, try the other" to help in the reading.

Page 9. The ue Sound.

Like the ow spelling, the three spellings used for the ue sound can also have an alternative. In this case the alternative is the oo sound, as in moon. Examples of these ue/u-e/ew, spellings with the ue sound are cue/cube/few. Examples with the oo sound are blue/June/flew. Again in reading, "if one way doesn't work, try the other". In writing though, the correct one has to be learned to get the right spelling.

Pages 11-14. An easy Reading Book.

Pull out the middle pages to make this small book. All the sounds introduced in the Jolly Phonics Workbooks are included in the words in the book, together with a few of the 'tricky' words. The child should be able to read it with only a little help.

Page 22. Sentence Writing.

By now the child should be able to write small sentences. The grammar and spelling may not always be correct in the early stages but with encouragement and teaching these skills will develop.

Pencil Hold.

Keep ensuring that the child has a good pencil hold between the thumb and first two fingers.

The Jolly Phonics Workbooks teach the skills for reading and writing

All the letter sounds of English are introduced (not just the alphabet), with an 'action' for each. Exercises show how to use the letter sounds to read and to spell, along with ways of learning the 'tricky' spellings. The correct way to form each letter is shown and in later Workbooks joined-up (cursive) writing is introduced.
