When you read a text for the first time, try to understand the general sense of it.

What to wear

☐ We shouldn't **judge** a person by their appearance but we do. In fact, the experts say that when we meet someone for the first time we make a decision about what that person is like in three seconds. But what do we look at? One of the most important things is clothes, but it isn't the **brand** of clothes that people wear that is important. The important thing is to wear the right clothes for the occasion.

☐ Schools have always understood this and a lot of them ask their students to wear a uniform. Schools where uniforms are not compulsory often give their students a **dress code** to follow. Why? A lot of teachers think a uniform makes students feel that they are part of their school and that their uniform helps them to be serious about their studies. Teachers say that uniforms can help in other ways too. If all the students wear one, they can't judge each other because of their clothes. They don't know if other students are from rich or poor families. It also **avoids** arguments about who, or what, is **fashionable**.



☐ However, it is not only schools that want people to dress in a certain way. We all have ideas that are really **stereotypes** about what the people in certain professions should wear. If we visit a doctor, we **expect** to see **respectable** clothes under the doctor's white coat. When we go into a bank we expect the staff to wear suits or dresses. In fact, a lot of companies have dress codes for their **staff** because they know that when their customers visit them, they expect to see people dressed in certain types of clothes. Even university students, who often wear a **casual** 'uniform' of jeans and T-shirts, **invest** in a suit or dress to **attend** job interviews in their final year. They know a smart appearance can help them get a job.



☐ But can our clothes really tell people what we are like? Maybe not, but they can show our **attitude** to what we're doing at that moment. When people see us in the 'right' clothes they think we are serious about what we are doing. Furthermore, if we are clean, smart and polite, people will have **confidence** in us. But if a person is good at their job, are the clothes they wear really important? Well, would you feel happy visiting a doctor who is wearing a dirty old T-shirt and **torn** jeans?

On the morning of 31 October 2003 Bethany Hamilton **set off** to go surfing with some friends in Hawaii. There wasn't a cloud in the sky, the sun was shining and it was a perfect day for surfing on the big waves near the shores of Kauai island.

The call of the wild

by Jack London

Biography

Jack London was born in California, USA, in 1876. As a young man in 1897, he took part in the famous Klondike Gold Rush, when a huge number of people rushed to the Yukon in Canada to look for gold. When London returned to California in 1898, he started writing stories. His novels *The Call of the Wild* and *White Fang* are based on his experiences in the Yukon. He died in 1916.

Buck did not read the newspapers. He did not know that trouble was coming for every big dog in California. Men had found gold in the Yukon, and these men wanted big, strong dogs to work in the cold and snow of the north.

Buck lived in Mr Miller's big house in the sunny Santa Clara valley. There were large gardens and fields of fruit trees around the house, and a river nearby. In a big place like this, of course, there were many dogs. There were house dogs and farm dogs, but they were not important. Buck was chief dog; he was born here, and this was his place. He was four years old and weighed sixty kilos. He went swimming with Mr Miller's sons, and walking with his daughters. He carried the grandchildren on his back, and he sat at Mr Miller's feet in front of the fire in winter.

But this was 1897, and Buck did not know that men and dogs were hurrying to north-west Canada to look for gold. And

he did not know that Manuel, one of Mr Miller's gardeners, needed money for his large family. One day, when Mr Miller was out, Manuel and Buck left the garden together. It was just an evening walk, Buck thought. No one saw them go, and only one man saw them arrive at the railway station. This man talked to Manuel, and gave him some money. Then he tied a piece of rope around Buck's neck.

Buck growled, and was surprised when the rope was pulled hard around his neck. He jumped at the man. The man caught him and suddenly Buck was on his back with his tongue out of his mouth. For a few moments he was unable to move, and it was easy for the two men to put him into the train.

When Buck woke up, the train was still moving. The man was sitting and watching him, but Buck was too quick for him and he bit the man's hand hard. Then the rope was pulled again and Buck had to let go.

The Boat Race

The Boat Race takes place in London every year in the spring. It is a race between two teams – one from Oxford University and the other from Cambridge University. Each team has eight rowers and a 'cox', the person who shouts instructions to the rowers and steers the boat. The rowers are usually very big and strong (often about 200 centimetres tall), but the cox is usually small and light so that the boat doesn't have to carry much extra weight.

The teams spend months preparing for the race. They begin training in September. Then, in December, there are practice races – but not between Oxford and Cambridge. Teams from the same university compete in practice races so that they can choose the best rowers for the 'big' race in the spring.

The race takes place along the river Thames, in west London. The course is 6,779 metres from start to finish. It is an extremely popular event. Every year, about 250,000 spectators watch the race from the banks of the river, and about 200 million people around the world watch it on TV.

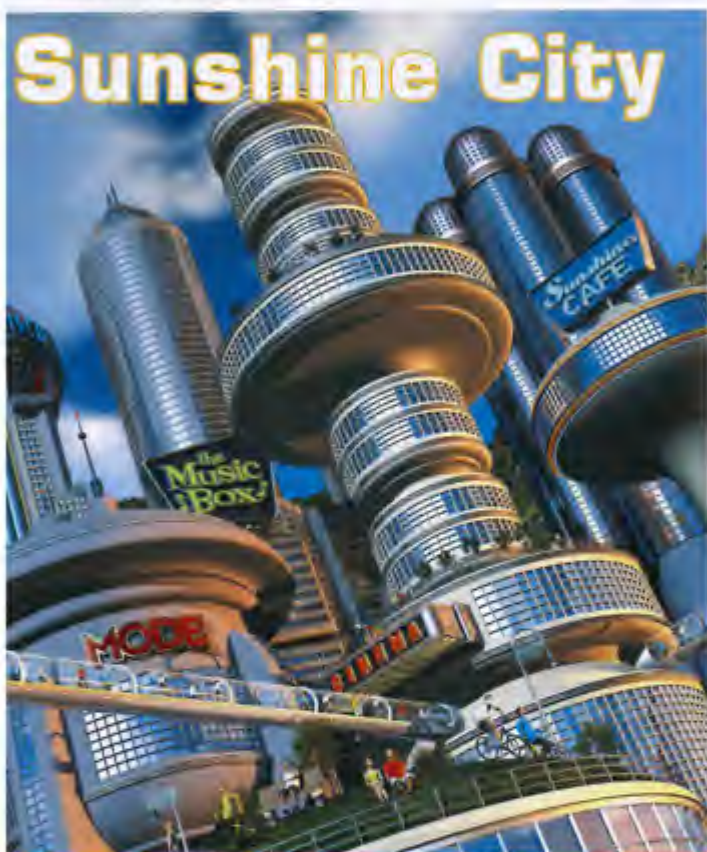

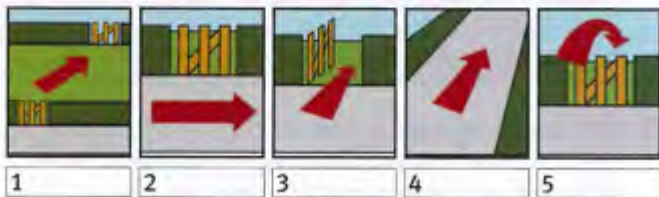

AN AWARD FOR BRAVERY



The George Cross is the highest award for bravery that a civilian in the UK can receive. It's named after King George VI, who decided to create the award in 1940. Since then, fewer than 160 people have received it, all of them for performing acts of **exceptional** heroism. The youngest recipient is John Bamford. John received the award in 1952, at the age of 15, after he suffered **dreadful** injuries while rescuing members of his family from a **horrific** fire at their home in Nottinghamshire.

The fire broke out in the early hours of the morning of 19 October, 1952. In the house at the time were John, his parents and his five younger brothers and sisters. When John and his father realized that something was wrong, they went downstairs to investigate. They opened the living room door and were **horrified** to see the interior of the room suddenly burst into flames. The heat was so **intense** that John and his father couldn't get back upstairs to help the rest of the family. Instead, they



climbed up the front of the house and managed to help John's mother and three of the children out of the bedroom window and on to a flat roof. They knew that two children remained inside the burning building.

John and his father climbed inside. They could hear the **distressed** cries of the two remaining children, who were only 4 and 6 years old, coming from a back bedroom. The father covered himself with a blanket and made a **heroic** attempt to reach the children. But before he could get to them, the blanket caught fire and the searing flames drove him back. Telling his father to wait outside at the back of the house, 15-year-old John then crawled through the flames and into the bedroom. Despite the **agonizing** burning sensation as the flames set fire to his shirt, he carried on until he reached his two younger brothers. They were on the bed, **terrified**. John picked them up and dropped the younger of the two boys out

Biography

Edith Nesbit was a children's author and poet. She was born in London in 1858. She was not typical of a woman in the late 19th century – she had short hair and she smoked, and she started writing short stories for a magazine to earn money for her husband and children. She went on to write many successful novels.

When the children first went to live at the white house, they talked about Father a lot and were always asking questions about him. But as time passed, their questions seemed to make Mother unhappy, so they stopped asking them. But they never forgot him.

Bobbie thought about Father often. She knew her mother was unhappy, and she worried a lot about that. And why was Father away for so long? Was there something that Mother wasn't telling them?

The answer came on the day she went to the station to fetch the magazines. They were old magazines which people left on trains or in the waiting room. Perks said the children could have them to read, and one day Bobbie went to fetch them.

'I'll just put some newspaper round them to keep them together,' said Perks. And he took an old newspaper from the heap.

The magazines were heavy, and Bobbie stopped to rest on the way home. She sat on the grass and dropped them beside her. As she did this, she looked at the newspaper and read some of the words on the page ... *and it was like a terrible dream.*

She never remembered how she got home. But she went to her room and locked the door. Then she took the newspaper off the magazines and looked at it again. The words seemed to jump out at her:

FIVE YEARS IN PRISON FOR SPY!

And the name of the 'spy' was the name of her father.

Bobbie was very quiet at tea-time.

'Is anything wrong?' Mother asked her.

'I'm all right,' said Bobbie.

But after tea, Mother went up to Bobbie's room. 'What's the matter?' she wanted to know.

For an answer, Bobbie took the newspaper from under her bed and showed it to her mother.

'Oh, Bobbie!' cried Mother. 'You don't believe it, do you? You don't believe Daddy is a spy?'

'No!' said Bobbie.

From Russia with Love

Poles either love it or hate it. The Palace of Culture and Science has **dominated** the Warsaw **skyline** for over 50 years, and is still one of the tallest **landmarks** in Europe. It was a personal gift from Joseph Stalin to the Polish people and he sent 3,500 workers from the former Soviet Union to build it. Work on the building **lasted** from May 1952 until July 1955 and 16 workers died in accidents during **construction**. It stands 231 metres high and it has got 42 storeys and 3,288 rooms including three theatres, a swimming pool, a museum and a congress hall. Today it **hosts** exhibitions and concerts and it is the home of a Polish university. It is also one of the city's most popular tourist attractions and every year thousands of people visit the terrace on the 35th floor and enjoy the views across the city.

Taking Liberties

Since 1886, the Statue of Liberty has been one of the most famous monuments in America – in fact, the world. The statue was a gift to America from the French people. They built the statue in France and then **shipped** it across the Atlantic Ocean in 350 pieces and re-built it in New York. They completed the work in 1886, and about a million people watched the opening **parade** on 28 October of that year. At the time, the Statue of Liberty was the tallest **structure** in New York at 93 metres and until 1902 the Americans used it as a **lighthouse**. Ships' captains could see its electric light from 40 kilometres away. Since



then, although they have built many taller buildings, the Statue of Liberty is still an impressive sight, and millions of visitors have climbed the 354 steps to the top.

Queen of the Castle

Balmoral Castle in Scotland was a present for Queen Victoria from her husband, Prince Albert, in 1852. 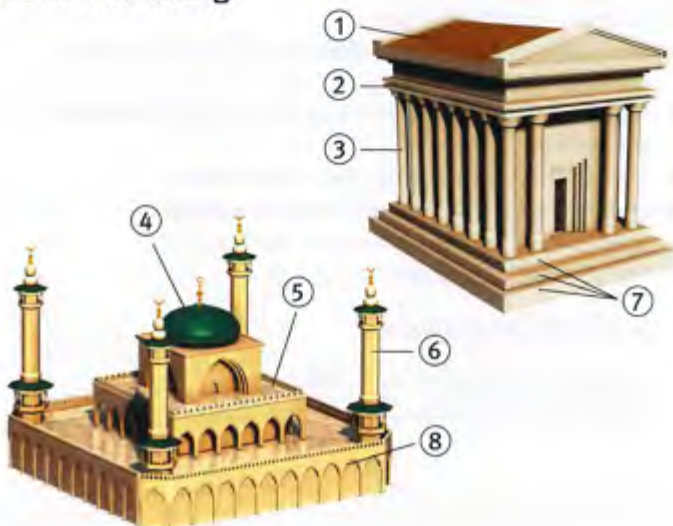

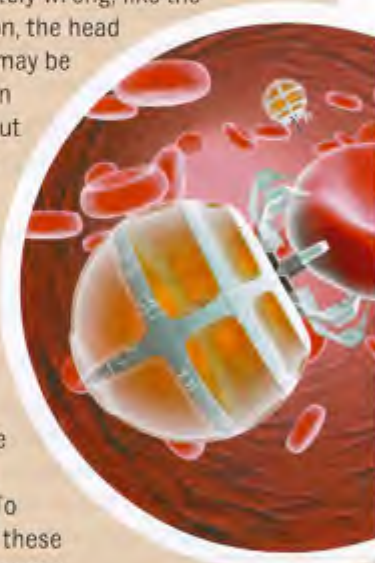
What's the big idea?

When people try to make **predictions** about the future, they usually get them completely wrong, like the prediction made by T.J. Watson, the head of IBM, in 1943: 'I think there may be a market for five computers in total in the world.' Today, about 45 million PCs are sold every year in the USA alone and computers are part of our everyday lives. But what surprises does technology have in store for us in the future? The answer is nanotechnology.

Nanotechnology is the science of building tiny machines, so small that they are **invisible**. To give you an idea of the **size** of these machines, the difference between a nanometre and a metre, two units of length, is the same as the difference between a **marble** and the planet Earth! Most scientists agree that nanotechnology will change our lives in the future – but how? At the moment it's difficult to predict whether this new technology will be like a wonderful dream, or a terrifying **nightmare**.

The dream

In the 1966 science fiction film *Fantastic Voyage*, an inventor develops an amazing new way to **cure** diseases. He **shrinks** a group of scientists and their **submarine** and **injects** them all into a patient. They then travel around the patient's body, visiting the different **organs** and repairing them. Of course, this is just a film – but the reality of nanotechnology is not very different. Scientists are already making nanobots, tiny robots that are smaller than a **virus**. In the future, doctors might be able to inject these into a patient, and the nanobots will travel around the body and repair the diseased parts.

The nightmare

Some people are worried that nanotechnology could be difficult to control. Nanobots might escape into the **environment** and damage people, plants and animals. Others have even more serious worries. Eric Drexler is a futurist, a scientist who makes predictions about the future. In his book *Engines of Creation* he predicted the invention of nanobots. He also described a special kind of nanobot that can make a copy of itself using the materials around it — and this is where the nightmare begins. In Michael Crichton's book *Prey*, nanobots **reproduce** themselves so quickly that they **consume** all the materials around them and then look for more ... and more, and more, eventually 'eating' the world. Some people are worried that this might really happen. The most extreme predictions (which very few scientists believe) say that nanobots could destroy the **entire** planet in about three hours!

Gulliver's Travels

by Jonathan Swift

Biography

Jonathan Swift was born in Dublin, Ireland, in 1667. During his life he published a great number of books, and *Gulliver's Travels* is the most famous. When it was published in 1726, it was a success with readers of all ages, both children and adults. Today, the amusing and fantastic adventures of its hero are still enjoyed by readers of all ages.

And so in about three weeks I began to speak the language of Lilliput. The King often visited me, and every time he came, I asked him to take off my chains. He explained that first I must promise not to fight against Lilliput or hurt Lilliputians, and that I must be searched for weapons. I agreed to both these things and carefully picked up two of his officers in my hands. I put them first in one pocket, then moved them to all my other pockets, except two which I kept secret. As they searched, they wrote down in a notebook details of all the things they found.

Afterwards I read some of their report:

'In the second coat pocket we found two very large pieces of wood, and inside them were great pieces of metal, very sharp. In another pocket there was a most wonderful engine, at the end of a long chain. The engine was inside a huge round container, which was made half of silver and half of another metal. This second metal was very strange as we could see through it to some mysterious writing and pictures. The engine made a continuous loud noise.'

The officers could not guess what these things were, but they were, of course, my two pocket knives and my watch. They also found my comb, a purse with several gold and silver coins, my gun and bullets.

The King wanted to know what the gun was used for.

'Bring it out,' he ordered me, 'and show me how it works.'

I took the gun out and put a bullet into it. 'Don't be afraid,' I warned the King. Then I fired the gun into the air.

It was the loudest noise the Lilliputians had ever heard. Hundreds of them thought they were dead, and fell down. The King himself was very frightened. As I gave my gun to the officials to keep, I warned them to be careful with it. They allowed me to keep all my other things, and I hoped that one day soon I would be free.

The joy of txt

- 1 The British love sending text messages. They send more than 2.5 billion every month. And most people now understand the language of text, with its numbers and missing letters. In fact, when a student at a Scottish school wrote an essay entirely 'in txt', his teacher gave him 'C+ 4 f4t' ('C+ for effort').
- 2 Although texting is a convenient and cheap method of staying in touch with your friends, it can also bring problems. In 2005, a British teenager became the first person in the world to receive treatment for an addiction to text messaging. In one year, the 19-year-old spent about £4,500 on texts. (He was sending about 700 texts a week.) He was also addicted to email, and sent 8,000 messages in one month from his computer at work. The treatment is working well, however, and he now spends no more than £10 a week on texts.

He's the world's fastest texter and recently set a new world record while he was appearing on Australian TV. He texted: 'The razor-toothed piranhas of the genera Serrasalmus and Pygocentrus are the most ferocious freshwater fish in the world. In reality they seldom attack a human.' It took him 67 seconds. (That's fast. Try it!) James sends a lot of text messages – about 2,500 a month. Fortunately, he doesn't get big bills because he works for a large mobile phone company!

Cheese rolling

Nobody knows exactly when this tradition at Cooper's Hill in the centre of England started, but it was centuries ago. The rules are simple: you have to **chase** a large, round cheese down a very **steep** hill. This dangerous event takes place every year at the end of May. Participants often break limbs or suffer from **concussion**, and even the spectators are at risk: one year, a cheese **soared** into the air and hit a 59-year-old grandmother on the head. 1997 was a particularly bad year for casualties; up to 37 people were injured. So in 1998, the local authorities banned the cheese rolling. However, because of all the **protests**, the ban only lasted a year and the tradition started again in 1999. To reduce the number of injuries, participants and spectators had to obey a few simple safety rules. Even so, about twelve people a year get injured.

The traditions they tried to ban

Water throwing festival

If you are visiting Thailand in April, it might be a good idea to take an umbrella with you. Why? Well, although April is the hottest month in Thailand, it is also when Thais, on 13 April, celebrate New Year. How do they celebrate it? By **dousing** people with water! Originally the Thais gently **poured** water over each other's hands as a sign of **respect**. This then developed into young people throwing water at each other to **relieve** the heat. Today, however, young people run or drive through the streets with buckets of water or enormous water-guns and throw water at anybody they see. So, if you don't want to get soaked, don't stand in the street. Fortunately, there are some rules. Firstly, participants **mustn't** throw water at **elderly** people. Secondly, they **mustn't** touch people. Thirdly, they **mustn't** throw water at car drivers. Every year people get killed or injured in road accidents during the festival and some people want to ban it.

Bull running

It is the most famous part of the Fiesta de San Fermín, a week-long festival that is held every July in Pamplona, Spain. Every morning at 8 o'clock, participants run through the streets in front of a small herd of six bulls, each about 600 kilos. Anybody can take part. You needn't sign up – you just have to stand in the street and wait for the bulls. However, most participants wear white clothes with a red handkerchief tied around their necks. The event is extremely dangerous. In 2004, eight participants were injured when the bulls caught them with their horns. All spectators must stay behind the double line of fences along the road. This is because the participants need to leap over the first line of fences into an empty space to escape from the bulls. Each year, there are people who want to ban the bull running. They aren't concerned about the number of injuries to the participants – they're protesting because, after the bull running, the bulls are killed in bull fights.

Wave power



This is a picture of Cumbre Vieja, a huge, active volcano on La Palma, the steepest island in the world, in the Canary Islands. Every few decades it erupts and scientists are worried because the walls of the volcano are getting weaker. Scientists fear that when it erupts, an enormous chunk of the volcano could collapse and fall into the sea. If this happened, it would be a catastrophe. Why? Because it would unleash a giant wave – a tsunami – the biggest ever recorded in history.

How would it happen?

The volcano is by the sea, and the water next to the volcano is about six kilometres deep. If the volcano collapsed, a landslide of 500 billion tonnes of rock would fall into the sea. This would create a huge tsunami about 100 metres high. (See Diagrams 1 and 2.)

What would happen next?

The wave would travel away from the Canary Islands in all directions at about 800 km/h. The other Canary Islands would immediately be covered by water. In less than an hour a 90-metre wave would flood north-west Africa.

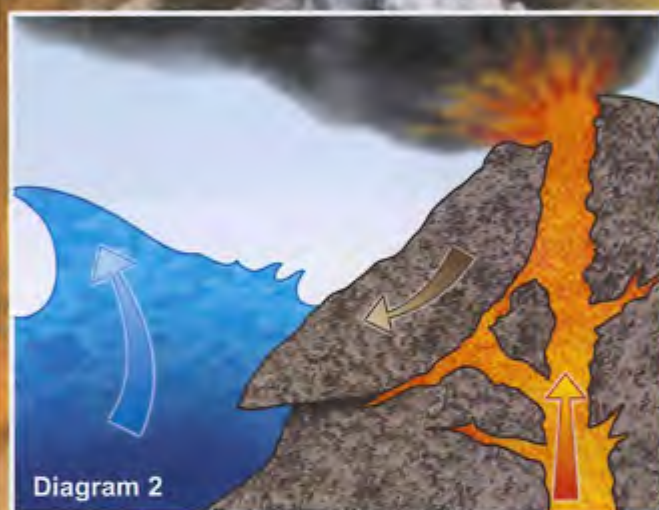
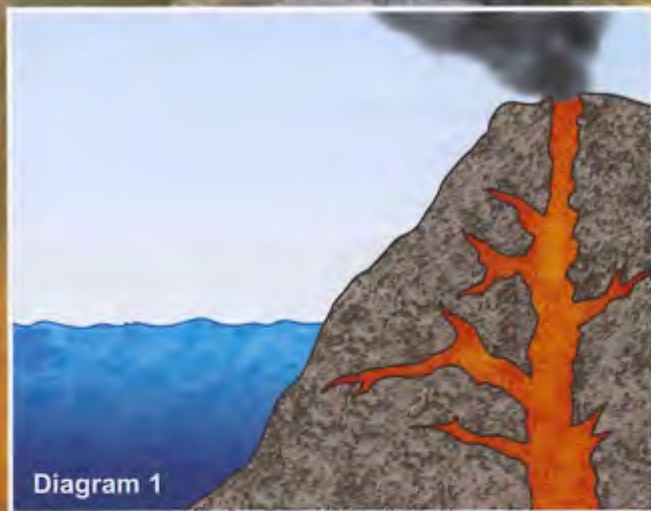
The side of the volcano faces west, across the Atlantic Ocean, which would protect Africa and Europe a little. However, a 12-metre tsunami would still crash against Lisbon within three hours and after five hours the tidal wave would reach Britain. The wave could travel a kilometre inland and devastate towns and villages. London would be flooded. (See map.)

How far would it travel?

The wave would have enough energy to cross the entire Atlantic Ocean. Eight hours after the eruption it would smash into the east coast of America. It would still be about 30 metres high. Boston would be hit first, followed by New York, then the coast down to Miami. The wave would create havoc in the Caribbean and Brazil too. It would travel for several kilometres inland because of the low coastline. It would flatten everything and kill thousands of people.

What can we do about it?

Nothing much, it seems. The scientists believe that it is not a question of if, but when. The volcano will collapse at some time in the future, but it could be hundreds or thousands of years from now. Furthermore, if only part of the volcano plunged into the sea, the tsunami would be much smaller. Scientists want to put better equipment on Cumbre Vieja, so that they can predict the volcano's eruptions in the future and give us an early warning of possible problems. Although nobody could stop the tsunami, at least the authorities could then evacuate the towns and cities that would be in danger and save thousands of lives.

THE THIRTY-NINE STEPS

by John Buchan

Biography

John Buchan was born in Perth, Scotland, in 1875. He started writing stories when he was at university, and wrote over a hundred books during his life. Some of them were about real events and people in history, but around forty of them were fiction. These were often gripping adventure stories such as *The Thirty-Nine Steps* (1915), which has been made into a film several times.

I came into a village and I saw a policeman standing outside the Post Office and reading something carefully. He looked up at the car, and stepped into the road, and held up a hand to stop me.

I almost did stop. But then I realized that the policeman had been reading about me. I supposed the police at the hotel had worked quickly, and contacted all the local villages. I drove faster, the policeman jumped out of my way, and I was soon out of the village.

I left the main road as soon as possible and tried a smaller one. It was not easy without a map, and I realized that I had been stupid to steal the car. It would help the police and the Black Stone to find me in any corner of Scotland. If I left it, and went off on foot, they would find me in an hour or two.

I took a road that went along a narrow valley, and then up onto the moor again. I was very hungry; I had eaten nothing since morning. And now, as I drove, I heard a noise in the sky, and there was a plane.

On the moor it would see me in a minute. I drove as fast as I could down into another valley, and towards a wood. Suddenly, a car appeared in front of me from a side road. There was no time to stop. I did the only thing possible and drove off the road into a hedge, hoping to hit something soft beyond. But I was out of luck. The car went through the hedge like a knife through butter,

and immediately began to fall. I jumped out and was caught by the branch of a tree, while the car disappeared into a river fifteen metres below.

A hand helped me out of the tree, and a frightened voice asked me if I was badly hurt. The speaker was a young man who was very alarmed and very sorry. I was more pleased than angry; it was a good way for the car to disappear.

An online threat

☐ On the evening of his 18th birthday, a teenager from a tiny village in northern Germany clicked 'send' on his computer. Within three hours, the postal service in Taiwan was in **chaos**, computers in hospitals and banks in Hong Kong had **crashed**, and trains in Australia and planes in the USA had come to a **halt**. How could a young man cause so many problems for people in places that were thousands of kilometres from his home? Of course, there was only one answer. He was the inventor of the terrible computer virus 'Sasser'.

☐ After a three-month long **investigation** the police **traced** the virus to teenager Sven Jaschan's computer and they **charged** him with criminal damage. In court a few months later the judge found him **guilty** of putting the 'Sasser' computer virus on the internet and he received a 21-month **suspended sentence**. He avoided a 5-year prison sentence because he was only 18 when he committed the crime. The virus infected millions of computer systems across the world, and caused millions of dollars of damage.

☐ Sven admitted his guilt to the detectives who finally found his home after a long search for the author of the virus. They had started looking for him in Russia because of false **clues** that Sven had written in the program. He had spent an enormous amount of time creating the 'Sasser' virus on the computer in his bedroom. He often spent ten hours a day in front of his computer but his parents hadn't known what he was doing at the time.

☐ When he **released** the virus on the internet, he didn't realize it would cause so much damage. He was just delighted that it had worked. 'I felt as if I had written a first-class essay,' said Sven, a student at a computer science school. 'I told my classmates – they thought it was terrific.' But his feelings changed very quickly. He was terrified when he saw a TV news report about the virus and the damage it had caused.

☐ Detectives **arrested** Sven after one of his classmates contacted Microsoft with a **tip-off** about his activities. Microsoft had offered a \$250,000 **reward** for information about the virus. However, Sven's teachers at school were astonished that Sven had created the virus. They said that he wasn't a brilliant computer student. 'There are others in the class who are better than him,' one teacher said!

Great journeys



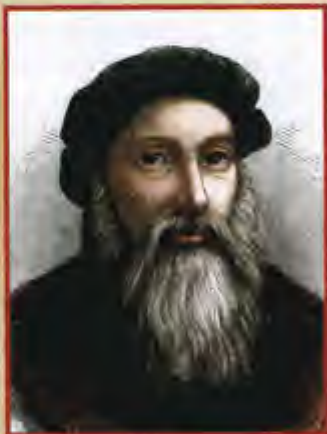
Marco Polo

In 1271, 18-year-old Marco Polo set off from his hometown of Venice with his father and uncle, who were wealthy **merchants**, to visit China. They went by ship to Anatolia, and travelled the rest of the way overland. They followed the Silk Road, along which merchants from China brought silks to Europe. The road runs north of the Himalayas and the journey took four years. The Emperor Kublai Khan welcomed them warmly and Marco became a civil servant and diplomat. After 17 years working for the emperor, the Polos decided to travel home. At first, the Khan refused to let them go, but in 1292 they received permission and returned home by sea, arriving in 1295. Marco spent the rest of his life as a merchant in Venice. At one time he was imprisoned and while in jail wrote an account of his travels which **inspired** other explorers such as Christopher Columbus.



Ibn Battuta

As a boy, Ibn Battuta studied the Holy Qur'an and became an expert in Muslim **theology**. When he was 21, he set off from Tangier on the **pilgrimage** to Makkah, and during the next 28 years he travelled more than 120,000 kilometres, even further than Marco Polo. After visiting Makkah he joined a **caravan** of pilgrims which was returning to Persia (now Iran). He continued to travel around the Middle East, studying the people and culture, and writing down anything that interested him, and he eventually arrived in Delhi. He stayed there for eight years working for the Sultan. In 1342 he was sent by the Sultan as his **ambassador** to China. Having survived a number of **shipwrecks**, he reached his **destination** in 1344. He was impressed by Chinese culture and their use of paper money, but after a year he decided to return home. Back in Tangier, Ibn Battuta wrote an account of his adventures called *Rihla*. Many of his **contemporaries** refused to believe the story of his travels and it was only long after his death that he came to be appreciated.



Vasco da Gama

In 1497 Vasco da Gama was sent by the King of Portugal to find a sea **route** to India. With four ships and 170 men, he sailed down the Atlantic Ocean, and after surviving a terrible storm, finally reached the Cape of Good Hope, the southern tip of Africa. There he **abandoned** his largest ship, and sailed up the **coast** of East Africa, stopping at various ports. The Portuguese were surprised to find rich Arab towns with stone houses on the coast. The Sultan of Melindi welcomed him and supplied two Arab **pilots** to guide him to India. Thanks to them he was able to cross the Indian Ocean to Calicut in southern India. Shortly after that, da Gama departed for home with a rich **cargo** of spices, but he lost 110 men and two ships. He sailed to India again in 1502 and after this voyage he **retired**. However, at the age of 64, he decided to return to India but died in Goa shortly after arriving there in 1524.

Kidnapped

by Robert Louis Stevenson

Biography

Robert Louis Stevenson was born in 1850 in Edinburgh, Scotland. His parents thought he would be an engineer like his father and grandfather. However, after studying engineering at university, he decided to fulfil his dream and be a writer. Stevenson was often unwell, and spent time in warmer countries to cure his problems. He was living on the island of Samoa when he died in 1894.

When I woke up in darkness, my head was hurting badly, and I was unable to move my hands or feet. I could hear the sailors' shouts and the sound of the wind and the waves. The whole world seemed to go up, up, up, and then down again. I felt very ill, and at first could not understand what was happening. After a while I realized that I must be somewhere inside the ship, which was moving very fast through the water. 'I've been kidnapped!' I thought angrily. It was clear that my uncle and the captain had planned it together. I began to feel frightened and hopeless, as I lay there in the dark.

Some hours later, a light shone in my face. Mr Riach, one of the ship's officers, stood looking down at me. He washed the cut on my head, gave me some water, and told me kindly to go to sleep. The next time he came, I was feeling very hot and ill. He had brought Captain Hoseason with him.

'Now, sir, see for yourself,' said Mr Riach. 'The lad's seriously ill. We must take him out of this unhealthy hole at once.'

'That's none of your business,' answered the captain. 'Ye're paid to do your job, not worry about the boy. He's staying down here.'

'I'm only paid to be an officer on this ship,' replied Mr Riach sharply. He looked hard at the captain. 'I'm not paid, like you, to kidnap and murder—'

Hoseason turned on him angrily. 'What did ye say?' he cried. 'What do ye mean?'

'You understand,' said Mr Riach, looking calmly at him.

'You should know me by now, Mr Riach. I'm a hard man. But if ye say the lad will die—'

'Aye, he will!' said Mr Riach.

'Well, sir, put him where ye like!'

So I was carried up into the sunlight a few minutes later, and put in a cabin where some of the sailors were sleeping. It was a wonderful feeling to see the daylight and to be able to talk to people again. I lay in the cabin for several days, and after a while began to feel better.

Sherlock Holmes

Detective stories are the most popular type of stories in the world. But who is the most famous fictional detective? Without a doubt, it is Sherlock Holmes.

The author of the Sherlock Holmes stories was Arthur Conan Doyle. He was born in Scotland in 1859 and studied medicine at Edinburgh University. After leaving university he moved to the south of England and worked as a doctor, but in his spare time he started to write detective stories.

The hero of the stories is a private detective called Sherlock Holmes, who lives at 221b Baker Street in London. There is now a museum at that address. (See <http://www.sherlock-holmes.co.uk>.) Holmes is tall and thin, with a long, sharp face. He usually wears a deerstalker hat, smokes a pipe or cigarettes, and carries a magnifying glass. He is an extremely intelligent man who always thinks logically about the crimes he is trying to solve. He is also a brilliant violinist. However, he has a dark side to his character: he is a lonely and rather sad man who is easily bored with everyday life. He often gets depressed and sometimes spends all day in bed. He is not married and says that he doesn't understand women. Holmes' assistant, and only friend, is Dr Watson. Watson describes him in one of the stories as 'a brain without a heart' and 'more a machine than a man'.

In 1895, after Conan Doyle had written 25 stories about Holmes, he got bored with his detective and decided that Holmes would die in the next story. At the end of the story called *The Final Problem*, Holmes fights Professor Moriarty, his greatest enemy, by a huge waterfall in Switzerland. They both die when they fall into the waterfall. But the Holmes stories were already incredibly popular and his fans were very upset. Conan Doyle had to bring his character back to life. He continued to write Sherlock Holmes stories for another 25 years. In the end, he wrote four novels and 56 short stories about the great detective.

Some verbs have irregular past simple (affirmative) forms.

There are no spelling rules for these forms: you need to learn them by heart. See the list of irregular verbs on page 124.

Irregular verbs behave in the same way as regular verbs in negative sentences and questions.

In negative sentences and questions we use *did* / *didn't* + the infinitive without *to* (NOT the past simple form) for regular and irregular verbs. The forms are the same for all persons, singular and plural (*I, you, he, we, etc.*).

The police officer believed his story. (NOT *The police officer was believing his story.* X)

Past continuous

We form the past continuous like this:

- *was* or *were* + the *-ing* form of the main verb
Elizabeth was eating. The children weren't listening.
Were you playing?

We use the past continuous:

- to describe an action lasting for some time or serving as the background to other events.
It was raining. Some children were playing rugby.
- We don't use the past continuous:
• with certain verbs, e.g. *believe, hate, like, love, need, know, prefer, want.*
Tim needed a new car. (NOT *Tim was needing a new car.* X)

We often use the past continuous and the past simple in the same sentence. The past continuous describes a background action or event in the past; the past simple describes a shorter action or event that happened during the longer action, or interrupted it.

It was raining when the accident happened.

My friends were watching TV when the fire started.

- to talk about recent events.

I've eaten fish and chips in England.
- to talk about an event or situation that began in the past and continues up to now. We use *for* with a period of time and *since* with a point in time.
My dad has worked for IBM for 10 years.
I've had this camera since May.
- to talk about actions that have an effect on the present.
I haven't finished my homework, so I can't go out.

We use both *been* and *gone* as the past participles of the verb *go*. We use *been* when somebody has returned.

John has been shopping. (He went shopping but he is here now.)

We use *gone* when somebody hasn't returned.

John has gone shopping. (He went shopping and he is still at the shops.)

We use *How long ...?* and the present perfect to ask how long a situation has continued up to the present.

'How long have you lived in Canada?' 'Since 2001.'

Present perfect and past simple

We use both the past simple and the present perfect to talk about finished actions.

We use the past simple to talk about completed events at a definite time in the past. The events have no connection with the present.

I visited Dubai last year.

We use the present perfect to talk about past events that have a connection with the present.

We use the present perfect to talk about past events that have a connection with the present.

Have you ever been to Ireland?

Yes, I have. I went last year.

We often use the past simple when we ask for or give more details following a *Have you ever ...?* question.

Have you ever been to Egypt?

Yes, I have. I went Cairo last year.

Have you ever been skiing?

Yes, I have.

Where did you go?

I went to Switzerland.

Are you going to be at home this weekend?
Yes, I am. / No, I'm not.

We use *going to*:

- to make predictions, especially when they are based on what we can see.
Look at that man! He's going to jump in the river!
- to talk about our intentions.
I'm going to invite her to my barbecue.

We use both *will* and *going to* to make predictions and to talk about our decisions. However, we use them in a slightly different way.

We use the zero conditional to talk about a result which follows a particular action. We use the present simple to describe the action and the present simple to describe the result.

We use **mustn't + infinitive without to** to say that something is prohibited, and it is very important not to do it.

We mustn't be late for school.

You mustn't use a mobile phone in the cinema.

We often use **must** or **mustn't** to express rules and laws.

In the UK, you must be 17 to drive a car.

You mustn't smoke on airplanes.

needn't

We use **needn't + infinitive without to** to say that something is not necessary but isn't against the rules.

You needn't bring a towel. There are towels at the swimming pool.
(But you can bring one if you want.)

You needn't take sandwiches as lunch is provided.
(But you can bring them if you want.)

First conditional

We use the first conditional to predict the result of a future action. We use the present simple to describe the action and **will + infinitive without to** to describe the result.

If you go to bed late, you'll be tired tomorrow.
(action) (result)

If I miss the bus, I'll take a taxi.
(action) (result)

The **if clause** can come before or after the main clause. If it comes after, we don't use a comma.

If you drink too much coffee, you won't sleep well.

You won't sleep well if you drink too much coffee.

We use the past tense to describe the unlikely, unreal or imaginary action or situation, and *would* + infinitive without *to* to describe the result.

If I had a lot of money, I'd travel around the world.

The *if* clause can come before or after the main clause. If it comes after, we don't use a comma.

If I lived in the country, I'd have a horse.

I'd have a horse if I lived in the country.

I wish ...

We use *wish* + past simple or past continuous to say that we want something to be different from how it is now.

The present situation: Alison has brown eyes.

Wish: Alison wishes she had blue eyes.

The present situation: It's cold. I am wearing a jacket.

Wish: I wish I was wearing a coat.

After *if* and *wish* we sometimes use *were* rather than *was* with *I / he / she / it*. *were* is more formal than *was*.

If I were you I would get some advice.

I wish I were able to attend.

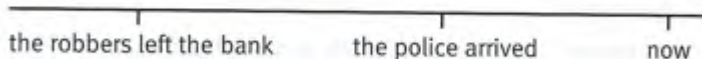

Direct speech	Reported speech
Present simple →	Past simple
'I don't like dogs,' Ben said.	Ben said (that) he didn't like dogs.
'My dad is at work,' Becky said.	Becky said that her dad was at work.
Present continuous →	Past continuous
'He's wearing a blue top,' Michelle said.	Michelle said (that) he was wearing a blue top.
Past simple →	Past perfect
'We moved to London in 2000,' Phil said.	Phil said (that) they had moved to London in 2000.

It is not necessary to use *that* in reported speech.

The pronouns sometimes change, depending on the context.

She said that **her** name was Jill.
