Today the nation breathed a sigh of relief as police officers recovered the famous painting *Seahorses* by J. H. Randolph, which was stolen from the National Art Gallery last week.

Public interest in Randolph's work increased after a documentary exploring his gripping but tragic life was broadcast last year. The painter, who died in the early 1820s while living in Paris, was described as a man 'of great mind and exceptional abilities'. A priceless collection of his work is being displayed at the National Art Gallery until 28 June, with the main focus being the 18th-century masterpiece *Seahorses*.

Using information from an eyewitness report, officers were able to identify one of the thieves from a distinctive mark on his right hand. Searching through medical records held in the National Prison Archives, the police discovered his identity. Pretending to be private buyers, undercover officers were able to arrange a meeting with the thieves, arrest them and recover the painting, which was remarkably undamaged.

The Elderly Care Crisis

As the global population increases and life expectancy continues to rise, we are becoming an increasingly ageing population. However, the growing number of citizens living for longer than previous generations means that existing medical services are faced with an increased amount of age-related health issues. Therefore, there is a greater need for a support system which not only provides the elderly with the care they require, but also ensures that they enjoy a good quality of life.

Most families choose to care for elderly relatives in the family home. Studies show that 90% of the elderly in this situation rate their living conditions very highly. Apparently, for those suffering from illnesses such as mental deterioration, the family home can prove more effective at helping to remember information than treatment at specialised care facilities. However, for those who have no one to look after them but require day-to-day assistance, retirement homes provide essential care, and also form a supportive social community.

In both cases, the balance between care and independence needs to be maintained. Research shows that happiness and a sense of purpose are vital to both long life and good health. Furthermore, surveys have shown that life satisfaction among the elderly largely depends on whether or not they are able to continue having a level of independence. Those who are mostly able to care for themselves, and particularly those with high involvement in community activities, score highly in life satisfaction surveys. This highlights the importance for future care programmes to balance the degree of care an individual needs to remain healthy with the degree of independence they require for emotional well-being.
